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From the Parish Clerk

Drainage - in the last newsletter, I reported that a survey had revealed that there were major problems with the drainage system from the Village Hall to the outfall on the other side of the A418. I have asked if there is any chance of the necessary work being done before the end of March, but am told that the necessary work cannot be undertaken until after April, in the next financial year, due to budget constraints.

Sandy Lane flooding - I have also asked what is happening about the water running down Sandy Lane, which has resulted in thick, dangerous ice in recent weeks. I am told that this is being looked into by Tim Wilde from Oxfordshire Highways, as well as the icy corner at Draycot.

Ditching and waterways - some work has been done on ditching and waterways, following the resolution by the Parish Council to allocate monies for this purpose. Monies have also been budgeted for 2009-10 to carry on this work.

Station Yard housing - you will have noticed that work on the Station Yard site continues apace. The Parish Council was asked to suggest a name for the road, and Station Yard was

Accident Statistics Show Welcome Reduction

Oxfordshire County Council has targets to reduce accidents on its roads over the period from 2000 to 2010 by 50% for all fatal and serious injuries, 60% for fatal and serious injuries involving children between 0 and 15 and 20% for all slight injuries. Because there can be variations from year to year the targets are based on the average annual injuries for 1994 to 1998. The latest figures available up to and including 2007 show that good progress has been made as the following statistics show:

The nature of road accidents is that there can be large variations from year to year. However the downward trend towards the 2010 targets is very encouraging, although there is no room for complacency and efforts are continually being made to reduce accidents on our roads.

Future Temporary Closure of A329 at Milton Common.

The saga continues! UK Highways, following further investigations, have concluded that the deterioration in the bridge over the motorway is not as far advanced as was originally feared and that a fuel pipe contained in the bridge plans does not actually exist. They have sent a report to independent specialist consultants for review and comment. They are now saying that it is unlikely that work will start before the Summer/Autumn of this year. The good

news is that they do not expect the same level of disruption to traffic as was first reported when the repairs finally commence. Does any one of my age recall "The Continuing Story of Peyton Place?"

County Four-Year-Olds to Start School Full Time.

From January 2009 all children are entitled to a full-time school place for the whole of the academic year in which they turn five. Previously they were only entitled to a half-time place from the September after their fourth birthday, which then became a full-time place in the term after their fifth birthday.

From the Vicar

This month's magazine letter is written by Stevie Cross. During this year the letter will be written in turns by one of the team vicars from the Wheatley Team Ministry. This will give us a lot more variety in our church contributions.

Christmas and New Year celebrations are well behind us and I hope that you all had a happy and healthy time. The beginning of February sees the last of the church's Christmas celebrations, the final mention of the baby Jesus in the bible.

Candlemas - 2 February - is one of those lesser known events and sitting here in the middle of January with the heating on I am reminded of the old rhyme:-

*If Candlemas day be fair and bright,
Winter will have another flight.
If Candlemas day be shower and rain,
Winter is gone and will not come again*

"Candlemas" is the day for observing the ritual purification of Mary forty days after the birth of Jesus as well as the presentation of Jesus in the Temple in Jerusalem as required by Jewish law (Luke 2:21-40 & Lev.12). It is celebrated at the same time as the Celtic festival of Imbolc which had great significance in the rural calendar, because the date lies half way between the winter solstice and the spring equinox, so it marks the day upon which winter is half over!

The Mass of Lighted Candles can be traced to at least 543 AD and is mentioned by Bede. It was at the presentation of Jesus in the temple that the old man Simeon moved by the Holy Spirit came to speak with the holy family the words which have become an important part of evening prayer, the Nunc Dimittis, where he refers to the infant Christ, "*A light to lighten the Gentiles, and the glory of thy people Israel.*"

We have enjoyed the mystery of candlelit carol services, Advent candles etc., but must not forget that Jesus, the light of the world, is for all times and all places, not just this time of year. In the old days at Candlemas huge bundles of candles would be stacked in church waiting to be blessed, enough candles to see the church alight throughout the year. We too are called to see that the light of the love of God is shining in our parishes throughout the year.

With the current economic climate, job losses and falling savings, it does seem a very dark time of year and for many people money worries are piling up. There may not be very much we can practically do to help but often a smile, a word and a prayer can help to bring some light into a dark situation. So let's not worry what the weather is doing on 2 February, but as we leave the baby for this year, think how we will follow the man he became. If we can strive to follow the two great commandments to love God and love our neighbour then the warmth of God's love can be spread around.

I pray that we, like Simeon and Anna may know the glory of the Living Lord and reflect his light in the year ahead.

Wheatley issues

Due to reports of anti-social behaviour and criminal damage in the area, three youths were signed up Acceptable Behaviour Contracts (ABC's). These contracts specify what behaviour the youths carry out which is unacceptable and advises them of what they should not do and where they should not go. Local officers monitor these youths and their ABC's and if a youth breaches their ABC then arrangements can be made to apply for an Anti Social Behaviour Order (ASBO) from the courts.

In January the Wheatley Area Neighbourhood Action Group (NAG) carried out public consultation around the area to find out what local issues the police and other agencies within the NAG need to be dealing with.

Currently Wheatley NAG priorities are speeding, parking and vandalism to telephone boxes and bus shelters.

Local officers are happy to report that incidents of vandalism to telephone boxes and bus shelters have reduced to almost nothing over the last year, and the issues of parking and particularly speeding will be tackled again in the new year, in part by using our new SID.

Speed Enforcement/Road safety

Local officers will soon be using our new SID (Speed Indicator Device). It will be used at

numerous locations around the area on a regular basis. Drivers who drive past the SID at excessive speed will have their car details taken and these details will be forwarded to Thames Valley Police roads policing. First time offenders will receive a warning letter which will be recorded by Thames Valley Police. Further incidents by the same vehicle will be recorded and may result in formal action.

Community Safety/Engagement

Your local Neighbourhood police team are in the process of re-launching a new and revitalised country watch scheme across the area. Farms and other agricultural premises and businesses will be contacted by local officers with a view to having the owners sign up to Countrywatch. This is a free service maintained and co-ordinated by the police. Farms and other agricultural premises, etc. can sign up to Countrywatch free of charge and have their contact details placed on a secure email system. As and when Thames Valley Police receive intelligence or other useful information to farmers, etc. this information will be distributed to Countrywatch members via the email messaging system. Countrywatch members will also have a local police contact who they can discuss issues with and receive free crime reduction advice. Members will also receive signs which can be placed at suitable points on their premises which indicate they are members of Countrywatch and these signs will hopefully deter casual offenders/trespassers. The paperwork required consists of one form which takes 2 minutes to complete and the visiting police staff will even put the signs up for you! Please support this initiative to make farming and agricultural premises safer.

M40 Chilterns Environmental Group January 2009 Report

Junction 7 Bridgeworks

John Gardner of the Highways Agency together with UK Highways has now completed their reworking of the M40 Junction 7 Bridgeworks programme.

It's apparently no longer necessary to replace the surface or deck of the bridge; they merely have to renew the joints in the surface, this is in order to make them waterproof. This work will take them just a week and can be undertaken without the bridge closure. They will merely use temporary traffic lights to control the traffic flow across the bridge in one direction at any one time. This is expected to take place in the summer of 2009.

In the Autumn, once they are sure that the remedial work is successful in stopping the water penetration of the bridge piers, they will proceed with the works to repair the piers themselves. This will be undertaken without dismantling them. This is likely to involve temporary closure of the M40 Motorway, probably overnight each time, necessary with no traffic management scheme in place.

Milton Common Noise Barriers

Lord Andrew Adonis, Minister of Transport has responded to an enquiring letter about the Highways Agency's continuing work on the study of noise mitigation measures on the M40 at Milton Common. His letter of reply stated:

"The proposals for the bridgeworks at Junction 7 of the M40 have undergone significant changes since the M40 CEG and Tom Harris' meeting on 26 March 2008.

A fundamental review of the works required to the structure has established that the bridge deck does not need to be replaced as was previously thought. Instead its condition can be maintained by remedial works. In consequence, the Highways Agency no longer envisages the need for traffic management on the M40, and hence the potential opportunity to reduce costs by installing noise mitigation measures at Junction 7 in parallel to the forthcoming bridgeworks is no longer an option."

What Lord Adonis failed to recognise in the M40 CEG's Scoping Study, is that Noise Absorbent Barriers can be installed inside the existing barriers on the West Side of Milton Common without the requirement for traffic management. To the East or London bound side of the bridge, a barrier can also be installed on private land adjoining the motorway side. In the absence of an existing protective barrier, for safety reasons the hard shoulder should be closed during the work.

Help from our County Councillor

On a positive note, David Turner, our County Councillor, is working very closely with our group. David is investigating a joint funding scheme with either the SODC or County Council or both, contributing towards the costs of providing absorbent environmental noise barriers along the M40 at Milton Common. A similar joint funding scheme was proposed, submitted and approved for the A404M - M4 Junction 8/9 to Maidenhead Thicket when this bypass was constructed back in the late 1990's.

If David manages to persuade either of these authorities to trump up some cash, our chances of obtaining Effective Noise Mitigation Measures at Milton Common will improve.

To conclude, our current chances of having Effective Noise Mitigation Measures installed at Milton Common have now greatly diminished following the letter from Lord Adonis.

The impact of the Highways Agency decision to suddenly change the repair status of this bridge from "urgent repairs needed" to "no longer required", together with the greatly reduced time scale to undertake the repairs has removed our justification to install fencing whilst the bridge was being repaired. Our MP John Howell has been asked to discuss how the bridge repair status changed so dramatically with Lord Adonis.

Newington Nurseries

Perfect Start

Once the decorations have been packed away for another year, it's time to get your gardening head on again. Early season planting is a great way of getting everyone in the family into the spirit of the growing year. If you can, get to work outside, otherwise spread some newspapers out on the floor and get ready to plant. Visit the nursery for containers, compost and some beautiful plants for potting-up. Children will love the idea of "indoor gardening" and planting containers will be a fun and rewarding activity for them if the weather is against you.

Erica, or Heath, is the ideal choice of plant. It's an evergreen shrub, similar to Heather (*Calluna*). However, unlike Heather, many species and varieties of *Erica* will tolerate both acid and alkaline conditions, allowing them to be used in a wider variety of garden situations, and if you want to grow them in containers, you can manage the soil conditions to suit those species that must have acid soil. Check when you buy and get the right plants for your situation.

Erica carnea (Alpine Heath or Winter Heath) is an excellent choice for getting maximum benefit right now. Flowers may be reddish-purple, pink or white, and foliage is generally mid to dark green but can also be yellow, golden or even orange-red. Look out for *Erica carnea* 'Ann Sparkes' with its rose-pink flowers and dark golden foliage or 'December Red' with its pink to purplish flowers. The flowers of 'Springwood White' are fabulous as is its bright green foliage. 'Foxhollow' is another winner - the colder it gets, the more interesting its foliage becomes. During mild winter weather, foliage is yellow with bronze tips but as temperatures drop, it becomes orange-red.

In their native habitat, *Ericas* grow on sunny slopes bordering pine forests but they are also tolerant of deep shade. Growing them in full sun however enhances their foliage colour. They are extremely hardy, being able to grow in extremely cold and snowy conditions, their flower shoots popping up through blankets of snow. Aftercare is easy. The plants should be pruned immediately after flowering. This can be carried out by lightly trimming with a pair of shears. Simply cut back the flowered stems. This will ensure compact bushy plants.

Heaths make excellent partners for dwarf conifers, either in borders or in large containers. Alternatively, grow them with others of their own kind for a delightful display. They're easy to care for and will give years of enjoyment. Establishing evergreen shrubs and conifers is also a fantastic way of doing your bit to improve air quality. Evergreens have been proven to be effective at removing particulates so that's another powerful reason to get planting.

Colourful, tough and even potentially beneficial to our health (Heaths are very pollution tolerant), evergreen shrubs certainly earn a rightful place in our gardens. The weather can throw anything at us but we all want to kick-off the New Year with some colour and fun. *Erica* is just the plant for this.

GREAT HASELEY AND DISTRICT HORTICULTURAL SOCIETY

Tasks for February in the garden include pruning of Wisteria and other garden shrubs, cutting autumn fruiting raspberries to the ground, and tipping back summer fruiting raspberries. In mild areas, towards the end of the month prune roses. For hybrid T roses, cut back the strongest growth to about 23cms, and less vigorous stems to about 15cms. Take out any very old or diseased wood or stems that cross. For floribunda roses, prune vigorous 1 year old shoots between a third and a half and cut back older growth to 15-23cms, and as the plant becomes crowded with stems, cut out 1 or 2 of the older stems. For established shrub roses, cut out about a third of the oldest and woodier stems, to encourage new shoots, and for repeat flowering ramblers, cut out long and overgrown branches whilst they are free of leaves and you can see the stems. Do not prune non-repeat flowering climbers and ramblers.

In the vegetable garden, continue sowing broad beans and shallots towards the end of the month. Carrots, celeriac, lettuces, beetroot and spinach seeds can be sown if milder weather is forecast, or cover with fleece or cloches, and start to chit early potatoes.

There has been a recent rise in enquiries on redundancy. Where an employer is making 20 or more employees redundant, this is called a "collective redundancy". He has to consult with a recognised trade union where there is one. Where there is no recognised trade union, an employer should consult with employee representatives before issuing redundancy notices.

You can only be dismissed because you are genuinely redundant, e.g. your company's business, or part of the business has ceased or diminished, or is expected to diminish. When your employer chooses who to make redundant, it is illegal to use selection criteria which discriminate against anyone because of their age, gender, race, disability, sexual orientation, religion or belief.

To be entitled to statutory redundancy pay you need to have worked for the firm for at least two years continuously since the age of 16 and be an employee. Self-employed people do not qualify.

If you do not meet these conditions, you won't get a statutory redundancy payment, even if you are genuinely redundant. If you are excluded from statutory redundancy pay you may still be entitled to contractual redundancy pay from your employer under your contract.

This is a complicated area and if in this position you should seek help of an experienced adviser.
